## *Rooted in Love, Grounded in Grace, Growing for God*

Dear Friends,

In this column this year, we are going to focus on what it means to be a member of, or attached to, a church. Last month, we looked at the fact that every area of our life is to reflect the love of Christ.

The Book of Order, which defines our day to day activities as a Presbyterian congregation, states that another aspect of being a faithful member means that we are to “work in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment.”

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus highlighted that one of the places of blessedness was to be a peacemaker. When we choose to make peace, we are then called the children of God. This is our goal as followers of Jesus Christ, who is the Prince of Peace.

Now while this sounds great, making peace is more difficult than it sounds—especially in our world and society that is so divided. We humans naturally like to divide ourselves along a wide spectrum of distinguishing features. The problem today is that so many seek to divide instead of unite. Many seek to focus on differences instead of what we have in common. Many are pointing emotional fingers, identifying those who are the cause of the problems instead seeking to find ways to bring us together.

Being peacemakers means that we are to respond as James has identified in his letter, “Everyone must be quick to hear, slow to speak, and slow to anger for the anger of a human does not achieve the righteousness of God.”(1:19-20) What a difference if we all spent more time listening and less time arguing. What a difference in our world if we all spent more time seeking places of agreement instead of finding places of where anger is inflamed. We would transform the world if we practiced this simple advice!

Please remember that we are the faithful ones. And so as members and attenders of the Church, when we live out the love of Christ, we show others that we are truly grounded in grace, that we live in love, and are growing for God.

### Sunday School Snippets

**Toddler Class:** The toddlers have been learning of all the great things that Jesus did.

**Pre-K Class:** Congratulations to **Josiah Kesler**, and **Elsie Majeski** who memorized their Bible verse, "I am with you always." Matthew 28:20. Josiah and Elsie like to say the blessing before snack time, "ABC, 123, thank You God for feeding me." The Pre-K students have been learning about how much Jesus cares for us. He is never too busy, and He provides for us what we need. Jesus shows us how to love one another from the stories about Him in the Bible.

**K/1st Grade Class:** Congratulations to **Natalie Knepper**, **Colton McKinley**, **Lily South**, **Maggie Wise**, and **Norah Wise** for memorizing their Bible verse, "All things are possible with God." Mark 10:27. The students have been learning about how much Jesus loves us and forgives us. He is all powerful!

**2nd/3rd Grade Class:** Congratulations to **Natalie Farioli**, **Jeremy Hemphill**, **Kayleigh Rothove**, and **Lauren Scumpieru** for memorizing their Bible verse, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son that whosoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life." John 3:16. The students have been learning about Jesus' life on earth, the stories He told, the lessons He taught, and the miracles of His healing and bringing individuals back to life. The students learned how much He cares for us, His promise that He will always be with us, and He will never leave us alone. The class learned that if we believe in Him, we will have eternal life.

**4th/5th Grade Class:** The class is studying how Jesus gave us Good News to share every day; Jesus is God's Son and our Savior—the promised Messiah (as prophecies of the Old Testament foretold hundreds of years before His birth); and how He willingly died for our sins.

**6th-8th Grade Class:** The class has been studying how to defend yourself as a Christian, and what it means to be a Christian.

**9th-12th Grade Class:** The class is digging deeper into the stories of the Old Testament. They have recently studied Jonah, Cain, Abel, and the Tower of Babel. They are currently studying Noah.

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The children started preparing for Easter a month before Easter Sunday. Besides doing Easter crafts and lessons, going on egg hunts, etc., they opened three Resurrection Eggs for the three Sundays leading up to Easter, and the final three eggs were opened on Easter Sunday. Resurrection Eggs are plastic eggs, not filled with candy, but rather with Easter symbols. Each week, we would open up three eggs and talk about how these symbols related to the Easter Story. Here is a summary of the Resurrection Eggs message:

1. Donkey—A lowly donkey was given to Jesus to ride into Jerusalem just before His death and resurrection.
2. Silver coins—Judas accepted 30 silver coins for betraying Jesus into the hands of the Jewish leaders.
3. Passover cup—At Jesus' last supper with His disciples before He died on the cross, He used the cup of wine to explain His death. Christians still drink from a cup to remember Christ's blood poured out for us and our sins.
4. Praying hands—Praying hands remind us that Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray with His disciples.
5. Leather whip—After His trial by Pilate, the Roman soldiers used leather ropes, with rocks and metal woven in, to whip Jesus, leaving 39 deep gashes in His skin.
6. Crown of thorns—The soldiers who crucified Jesus placed a crown of thorns on His head so they could mock Him by saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!"
7. Nails—Three large nails were driven into Jesus' hands and feet to nail Him to the cross.
8. Dice—The Roman soldiers used dice to gamble for Jesus' robe.
9. Soldier's spear—Roman soldiers used a spear to pierce Jesus' side when He was on the cross.
10. Linen wrapping—Joseph of Arimathea wrapped the body of Jesus in a linen cloth after He died on the cross.
11. Stone—The huge stone that had covered the tomb was found rolled away.
12. Empty tomb—Jesus' tomb was empty because He rose from the dead!

The Sunday School students and students attending Kids of the Kingdom have been studying the Easter story this past month. We will end our Easter unit by having an Easter Quiz Bowl. The Quiz Bowl is set up like a Jeopardy game board. There are five categories to choose from: Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Garden of Gethsemane, The Crucifixion, and Easter Morning. We don't feature Daily Doubles on the game board, but we do feature Sunday Specials. The students are all given study sheets to prepare for the Quiz Bowl. The morning of the Quiz Bowl, teams are formed. At the end of the game, everyone is awarded a ribbon and a certificate.

On Easter Sunday, the children all received a bag full of colorful jelly beans, attached with the Jelly Bean Prayer. Each color of jelly bean represents a part of the Easter Story. Do you know the Jelly Bean Prayer? If not, here it is:

#### **The Colors of Easter**

Red is for the blood He gave.  
Green is for the grass He made.  
Yellow is for His sun so bright.  
Orange is for the edge of night.  
Black is for the sins we made.  
White is for the grace He gave.  
Purple is for His hours of sorrow.  
Pink is for our new tomorrows.

A bag full of jelly beans, colorful and sweet, is a prayer, is a promise, is everyone's treat.



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## Parish Nurse Nook

Spring has officially sprung! May is National Stroke Awareness month. I would find it hard to meet someone who hasn't been affected by stroke. Stroke has certainly affected my family.

Stroke is a disease that affects the arteries leading to and within the brain. It is the number 5 cause of death, and a leading cause of disability in the United States. A stroke occurs when a blood vessel that carries oxygen and nutrients to the brain is either blocked by a clot or ruptures. When that happens, part of the brain cannot get the blood (and oxygen) it needs, so it and brain cells die. A stroke can be caused either by a clot obstructing the flow of blood to the brain (called an ischemic stroke) or by a blood vessel rupturing and preventing blood flow to the brain (called a hemorrhagic stroke). A TIA (transient ischemic attack), or "mini stroke", is caused by a temporary clot. The brain is an extremely complex organ that controls various body functions. If a stroke occurs and blood flow can't reach the region that controls a particular body function, that part of the body won't work as it should. The effects of a stroke depend primarily on the location of the obstruction and the extent of brain tissue affected. However, because one side of the brain controls the opposite side of the body, a stroke affecting one side will result in neurological complications on the side of the body it affects.

As with many health issues, prevention is best. Up to 80% of strokes are preventable. If you have any of the following issues, talk to your practitioner about how you can manage your health and decrease your risk of stroke. These are some of the most common issues that will increase your risk of stroke (but not all of them). Hypertension is a leading cause of stroke, and the most significant controllable risk factor. If you smoke—STOP! The nicotine and carbon monoxide in cigarette smoke damage the cardiovascular system and pave the way for a stroke. The use of birth control pills combined with cigarette smoking can greatly increase the risk of stroke. Diabetes: If you have type 1 or 2 diabetes, control your blood sugar. Diet: A diet high in calories, saturated fat, trans fat, cholesterol and sodium is bad. But a diet containing five or more servings of fruits and vegetables a day may reduce the risk of stroke. Physical activity: If you don't move much, just remember to move more and sit less. Obesity: excess body weight and obesity are linked with an increased risk of high blood pressure, diabetes, heart disease, and stroke. Losing as little as five to ten pounds can make a significant difference in your risks.

ACT FAST—Know the symptoms of stroke. F: FACE—Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop? A: ARMS—Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward? S: SPEECH—Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Is their speech slurred or strange? T: TIME—If you observe any of these signs, call 9-1-1 immediately. Knowing when the onset of symptoms is, or the time the person was last known to be well is also helpful information to provide to healthcare providers.

### Quarterly Parish Nurse Education Event

We will be holding our quarterly Parish nurse Education event, Stop the Bleed, on Sunday, June 2, after the 11:00 service. Stop the Bleed is a campaign to build national resilience by better preparing the public to save lives by raising awareness of basic actions to stop life threatening bleeding following everyday emergencies, and man-made and natural disasters.

Join us for lunch, followed by a presentation and hands on practice that just might save your life or the life of your friends and family. Have you ever been in a situation and thought, "If only I had known what to do?" This class is specifically designed for the nonmedical audience, and provides training on direct pressure applications, wound packing, and use of a tourniquet. You are never too young or old to benefit from this class. **Please register by Sunday, May 26**, on the sign-up sheet in the parlor so that we can have the correct amount of materials and food. This is a fun training, and one you won't want to miss!
