Even though we are not meeting together on Sunday mornings, Sunday School still continues. Each week, packets are sent home to Sunday School families. They include their Sunday School work, children's bulletins, appropriate crafts, etc. At Easter, the Sunday School packets contained lots of fun Easter activities and crafts to do during Easter week. We sure miss getting together on Sunday mornings! Until then, the students all have their lessons to do at home. If the students bring back their completed lessons, they will receive a gift card to Sweet Frog or Chick-fil A.

Each Easter Season, leading up to Easter and on Easter morning, the children open Easter eggs during the Sunday School Opening. We started opening up our Resurrection Eggs back in early March. Unfortunately, we did not finish opening our eggs. Here are what the Easter eggs had inside. Each egg had something in it that depicted the Easter message:

1. Donkey—A lowly donkey was given to Jesus to ride into Jerusalem just before His death and resurrection.
  2. Silver coins—Judas accepted 30 silver coins for betraying Jesus into the hands of the Jewish leaders.
  3. Passover cup—At Jesus' last supper with His disciples before He died on the cross, He used the cup of wine to explain His death. Christians still drink from a cup to remember Christ's blood poured out for us and our sins.
  4. Praying hands—Praying hands remind us that Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray with His disciples.
  5. Leather whip—After His trial by Pilate, the Roman soldiers used leather ropes, with rocks and metal woven in, to whip Jesus, leaving 39 deep gashes in His skin.
  6. Crown of thorns—The soldiers who crucified Jesus placed a crown of thorns on His head so they could mock Him by saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!"
  7. Nails—Three large nails were driven into Jesus' hands and feet to nail Him to the cross.
  8. Dice—The Roman soldiers used dice to gamble for Jesus' robe.
  9. Soldier's spear—Roman soldiers used a spear to pierce Jesus' side when He was on the cross.
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11. Stone—The huge stone that had covered the tomb was found rolled away.
12. Empty tomb—Jesus' tomb was empty because He rose from the dead!

Each Easter, the Sunday School students receive a bag of jelly beans with the Jelly Bean Prayer attached to it. This year, since we were not able to meet, the students received the Jelly Bean Prayer with their Sunday School curriculum packets. The students had a small craft box to put together with the Jelly Bean Prayer written on it. When the students put the box together, they had a little container for their jelly beans. Each color of the jelly beans represent a part of the Easter story. Do you know the Jelly Bean Prayer? If not, here it is:

### **The Colors of Easter**

Red is for the blood He gave.  
Green is for the grass He made.  
Yellow is for His sun so bright.  
Orange is for the edge of night.  
Black is for the sins we made.  
White is for the grace He gave.  
Purple is for His hours of sorrow.  
Pink is for our new tomorrows.  
A bag full of jelly beans, colorful and sweet,  
is a prayer, is a promise, is everyone's treat.

## **Parish Nurse Nook, by Kelly Llewellyn**

Happy May and to all the mothers in our congregation, Happy Mother's Day to you! Each of you are a true blessing! As a mother and parish nurse, I was asked by my "Lupus Warrior", Hayden, to share with you about National Lupus Awareness Month. She wanted me to share about this disease, and also a bit about her story. You see, almost two years ago, at age 10, she was diagnosed with Systemic Lupus Erythematosus (SLE, or Lupus). A scary time in all our lives, but nonetheless one that has brought us many blessings. Perhaps some of you know this, or perhaps you might be learning this for the first time. Hayden is often seen as talkative, interactive, and involved at church. You see, with Lupus, people often don't "look sick". In short, Lupus is an unpredictable and misunderstood autoimmune disease. It is difficult to diagnose, hard to live with, and challenging to treat. The range of symptoms is vast and strikes without warning.

Lupus is a chronic disease that can cause inflammation and pain in any part of your body. As an autoimmune disease, the body system that usually fights infections attacks healthy tissue instead. Lupus most commonly affects your skin, joints, and internal organs like kidneys and heart. Because Lupus affects many parts of the body, it can cause a lot of different symptoms, thus affecting everyone differently. There are four different types of Lupus. Systemic Lupus Erythematosus (SLE), the most common type (and what Hayden has), can be mild or severe. Cutaneous Lupus Erythematosus is limited to the skin and can cause many types of rashes and lesions. Drug-induced Lupus Erythematosus, is caused by certain prescription drugs. Neonatal Lupus, a rare condition that affects infants of women who have Lupus and is caused by antibodies from the mother acting upon the infant in the womb.

Diagnosing Lupus can be challenging. There's no single test that can give doctors a yes or no answer. Sometimes it can take months, or even years, to gather all the right information. We were fortunate to have a very quick diagnosis for Hayden; however, we are unsure of how long the Lupus had been brewing in her body before we started to see outward signs and symptoms of it. Making a Lupus diagnosis is kind of like putting together a puzzle. A doctor will look at several different puzzle pieces: symptoms, medical history, family history, and lab tests. If enough of the pieces fit together, a diagnosis of Lupus may be made.

Treating Lupus is a lifelong process as there is currently no cure for Lupus. The goals of a treatment plan for someone with Lupus are to control symptoms, reduce inflammation caused by Lupus, suppress your overactive immune system, prevent flares and treat them when they occur, and minimize damage to organs. Most of these goals are done through a combination of medications. Part of Hayden's treatment plan looks like this: sunscreen and a skin cream regimen every day, a handful of medications twice a day, a low sodium diet, controlling sensitivity to heat, monthly blood draws, doctor's appointments, and illness prevention, just to name a few. For her, she wants you to know that she is living a normal life with some adjustments, which have become part of her normal day.

Lupus affects approximately 1.5 million people in the United States. You may be surprised to learn of others you don't even realize also have this disease.

Our family invites you to show your support for all those with Lupus by wearing purple on Sunday, May 10 (World Lupus Day) and Friday, May 15 (Lupus Wear Purple Day). I also encourage you to let me know what diseases you would like me to share about in upcoming
