Dear Friends,

As we enter the fourth month of the new year, we need to remind ourselves of words that affirm. There can be many places where we read or have heard words that pain our heart. So it is very important for us to hear and listen to words that affirm great spiritual truths.

One of the greatest statements that I have ever heard, we celebrate at this time of the year—"Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here, but He has risen." (Luke 24:6) Or how about this statement of life, "So when it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and when the doors were shut where the disciples were...Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' And when He had said this, He showed them both His hands and His side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord." (John 20:19-20).

In the words of Jesus, "For God so loved you that He gave His one and only Son so that whoever believed in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." (John 3:16, personalized)

Maundy Thursday

Here's what's happening in Sunday School:

Pre-K Class: Congratulations to **Addi and Elsie Majeski** and to **Mason Jamison** for memorizing their Bible verse, "Worship the Lord." Psalm 96:9. Thank you to **Addi** (age 3) who is now blessing our snack, and congratulations to **Elsie** (age 5) who can recite the Pledge to the Christian Flag, Pledge to the Bible, and can also recite the Lord's Prayer. Wow! Elsie, we are so proud of you! The class is learning that we can worship God together by praying, singing, giving, and listening.

2nd/3rd Grade: Congratulations to **Colton McKinley** for such great attendance and participation. The class is studying and learning about Elijah.

4th/5th Grade: The class ended their study of Paul. Even though he was beaten, tortured, and imprisoned, he still remained strong, faithful, and joyful in the Lord. One of the most joyful letters Paul wrote was to the Philippians. He wrote this joy-filled letter while imprisoned. The students are now studying the prophets, starting with Elijah. They studied the lesson of the great contest on Mt. Carmel between Elijah, who was the prophet of the one true God, and the 450 prophets of Baal, who was a false god that they worshipped. There had been a drought in Israel for over three years. The contest was to see which was the true and living God. Elijah and the 450 prophets of Baal both set up an altar to offer a sacrifice to their God. Whichever God consumed the sacrifice with fire was the one and only true God. The prophets of Baal went first. They cried for hours for their god to consume their offering with fire. No luck. Then it was Elijah's turn. He called upon his God, and He sent a flame of fire to consume the burnt sacrifice and all the water Elijah had poured on his sacrifice. Now all the people knew that Elijah's God was the one and only true and living God. A heavy downpour came after this. At last the drought was finally ended. Congratulations to **Abby Boppe, Natalie Farioli, and Brody Hemphill** for memorizing their Bible verses: "*I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus*" Philippians 3:14, "*The Lord is the true God; He is the living God, the eternal King*" Jeremiah 10:10, "*I will exalt You, Lord, for You have lifted me out of the depths*" Psalm 30:1.

6th-8th Grade: Our class focused on a few exciting lessons: **God uses evil for good.** We talked about different types of evil and how God could use each one for good. **Persecution vs. conflict,** what is the difference and how do you know if you are being persecuted. **God takes us in unexpected directions.** Never say never to God. **The Holy Spirit helps us tell others about Jesus,** we don't have to do it by ourselves.

9th-12th Grade: The class is applying Biblical truths to all situations they may be facing.



During the weeks leading up to Easter, the children in Sunday School are opening Easter eggs, or as we call them, resurrection eggs. In each egg there is a symbol of something depicting the Easter story. Here is a summary of the resurrection eggs message:

1. Donkey—A lowly donkey was given to Jesus to ride into Jerusalem just before His death and resurrection.
2. Silver coins—Judas accepted 30 silver coins for betraying Jesus into the hands of the Jewish leaders.
3. Passover cup—At Jesus' last supper with His disciples before He died on the cross, He used the cup of wine to explain His death. Christians still drink from a cup to remember Christ's blood poured out for us and our sins.
4. Praying hands—Praying hands remind us that Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray with His disciples.
5. Leather whip—After His trial by Pilate, the Roman soldiers used leather ropes, with rocks and metal woven in, to whip Jesus, leaving 39 deep gashes in His skin.
6. Crown of thorns—The soldiers who crucified Jesus placed a crown of thorns on His head so they could mock Him by saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!"
7. Nails—Three large nails were driven into Jesus' hands and feet to nail Him to the cross.
8. Dice—The Roman soldiers used dice to gamble for Jesus' robe.
9. Soldier's spear—Roman soldiers used a spear to pierce Jesus' side when He was on the cross.
10. Linen wrapping—Joseph of Arimathea wrapped the body of Jesus in a linen cloth after He died on the cross.
11. Stone—The huge stone that had covered the tomb was found rolled away.
12. Empty tomb—Jesus' tomb was empty because He rose from the dead!

On Easter Sunday, the children will be receiving a bag full of colorful jelly beans, attached with the Jelly Bean Prayer. Each color of jelly beans represents a part of the Easter Story. Do you know the Jelly Bean Prayer? If not, here it is:

The Colors of Easter

Red is for the blood He gave.
 Green is for the grass He made.
 Yellow is for His sun so bright.
 Orange is for the edge of night.
 Black is for the sins we made.
 White is for the grace He gave.
 Purple is for His hours of sorrow.
 Pink is for our new tomorrows.
 A bag full of jelly beans, colorful and sweet,
 Is a prayer, is a promise, is everyone's treat!

The Sunday after Easter, the kids will review the Easter Story by playing Easter BINGO.

Thoughts on Covid-19

I have heard folks say that “this is the worst calamity to ever happen to us as a country.” “We can’t go to a movie, we can’t go out to eat—and I’m having trouble finding toilet paper. How bad does it need to be until I start to panic?”

Most of us lack a good historical perspective. And I think it may be instructive in times like this.

Think about your parents’ or grandparents’ generation—anyone who experienced the Great Depression in the 1920s and ‘30s. More than 15 million people were out of work—a full 25% of the population. There was no governmental safety net: no job meant no money. Fully one-half of all banks failed. The birth rate dropped below the replacement line for the first time ever in the United States. Nearly half the country fell below the poverty line.

And then consider the generation that fought in World War II. The average age of a soldier landing on the beaches on D-Day was 20 years old. The young men who stepped ashore had a 1 in 4 chance of surviving that day—and yet they came. Nearly 7,000 of them fell, making the ultimate sacrifice. In all, 416,800 American servicemen and women died in the global conflict.

In both those events, the country pulled together, and sacrifice was part of every citizen’s DNA.

So when I hear of someone complaining that their favorite restaurant is temporarily closed, I think back to the sacrifices made by previous generations. I’m not making light of the suffering of anyone who has been stricken with this virus. But those of us who remain healthy—but simply inconvenienced—should hold our complaints. They pale in light of what others have endured.

And please, remember that our God is in control. He holds history in His hands, and this disease has not taken Him by surprise.

Confirmation Class

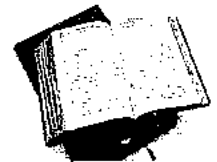

Library

Easter enhances our relationship with Jesus and our desire to be more like Him. There are many books in our library that offer ways to be drawn closer to Jesus. Here are a few books to consider:

- ◊ WWJD: The Question Everyone is Asking, by Bickel and Jantz. This little book with a big impact. Various life situations are followed by scripture references of how Jesus set the example to follow.
- ◊ In His Steps, by Charles Sheldon, answers the same question in a different way. His novel tells how a congregation reacted when challenged to respond to life's situation as Jesus would have done. Both books help readers realize what life might be like if we did what Jesus would do.
- ◊ Verdict on the Shroud, by Kenneth Stevenson and Gary Habermas tells the amazing story of the Shroud of Turin. Including photos, the scientific examination describes detailed evidence that this cloth may have covered Jesus' body.

These next two books provide interesting stories about women who have impacted our lives:

- ◊ Hidden Figures, by Margot Lee Shetterly, tells the story of black women mathematicians who helped with the space race from behind the scenes. These women continue to be honored by NASA today.
- ◊ Home: A Memoir of My Early Years, by Julie Andrews. In this memoir, Julie shares anecdotes from her personal and professional life, through her performance in *My Fair Lady* and *Camelot*. If her music has influenced your life, this large print book is for you!
