Dear Friends,

We will be looking at our mission statement for the next few months in these columns. Last month we looked at the fact that we value fellowship here at St. Andrew. Our statement begins with this intention: We intend to provide opportunities for people to know and care for one another.

The next intention is this: Worship and celebrate life in ways that are meaningful and satisfying, and which glorify God. We have declared that one of our intentions is to make worship central to who we are as the people of God.

Worship is defined as giving God what is due to Him. Worship is the act of acknowledging that God is the author of life, that God is the one who continues life, and it is God who will save us from the destructive nature of this world. As such, we need to lift the name of God and Jesus in our individual lives and in our corporate lives.

As we worship together, we demonstrate to the world that we are rooted in love, grounded in grace, and thus growing for God.

Sunday School Snippets:

Here is what is happening in Sunday School:

Toddler Class: We love our little ones. We now have 2 toddlers join this class, **Luka Bearese and Alma Twum-Bariah**. As Jesus says, "Let the little children come to me." and that is what we are doing. The class is studying how much Jesus loves us. They are also learning to use crayons as they do their activities.

Pre-K Class: We are learning that Jesus can do anything, Jesus loves us no matter what, and Jesus cares if we are lost. Congratulations to **Lachlan Bearese and Bry-an Twum-Barimah** for memorizing their Bible verse, "All things are possible with God." Mark 10:27. Both Bryan and Lachlan continue to show growth and understanding as they learn foundational concepts that grow their relationship with Jesus.

K/1st Grade: The students are learning about showing love, forgiveness and treating other well. They have been learning Bible Stories where Jesus illustrates those important qualities. Congratulations to **Michael McDonald** who participates well and to **Aiden Paul** who likes to help others.

2nd & 3rd Grade: Our class has been learning how God is indeed able to save us. "Christ Jesus Came into the world to save sinners" (I Timothy 1:15) God saved Noah and his family from death and destruction. What's more than this God graciously can save us from eternal death through HIS SON, Jesus Christ. We praise God for His mercy and undeserved gift of salvation. Our God is an awesome God! He wants us to follow His direction just as Abraham faithfully obeyed God. (Genesis 11:31) Furthermore, God wants us to get along with others" (Matthew 5:9) "Blessed are the peacemakers."

As referenced in last month's newsletter, our class has been earnestly diving deeply into the Biblical account of "Noah's Ark." (Genesis 6:9; 7:24 and 8:1-8:17) Diligently preparing for our upcoming finger puppet show, "Noah's Ark" presentation. Addi and Elsie Majeski, as well as Nikolai Bearese and Thomas Twum-Barimah, Jr. have all kindly welcomed the newest member of our class, Mason Jamison. They've been instrumental in helping Mason to learn the story of creation (Genesis 1:1-31) Addi and Elsie Majeski have been working on an amazing "Creation Dance" to serve as a wondaful memory tool to significally aid with recounting the days of creation. Nikolai Bearese and Thomas Twum-Barimah, Jr, have also provided Mason with excellent tips to assist in learning "The Days of Creation". I'm above and beyond proud of you all!

4th and 5th Grade: In November we have and will be studying the following themes: God hears our prayers. In Genesis 13:12, Lot chose the fertile plains east of the Jordan River and pitched his tents near Sodom. When Sodom was destroyed, God heard Lot's prayers and spared his family. Memory verse: "Be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people." (Ephesians 6:18).

God keeps his promises. In Genesis 15-22, we find that God kept his promises to Abraham. Memory verse: *"Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful."* (Hebrews 10:23).

God guides our everyday lives. In Genesis 24, when Isaac was 40 years old, Abraham did not want him marrying a Canaanite woman, so he sent his servant to find a wife for Isaac among their own people. It was a 450 mile trip. Immediately,



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God sent Rebekah who fulfilled the test. Memory Verse: "Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Savior." (Psalm 25:5). God helps us deal with conflict. In Genesis 26:11, during a time of famine Isaac and his wife faced many conflicts while traveling. Isaac planned to go to Egypt for help like his father before him, but he stopped at Geret. Here, Isaac lied to Abimelech, the Philistine King, telling him that Rebekah was his sister instead of his wife. God not only protected Isaac, He also blessed Isaac materially. While in Geret, all his crops, servants, flocks, and possessions were greatly increased by God. The famine was still going on and Isaac moved once to avoid conflict while in Geret. Memory verse: "Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace." (Romans 14:19)

Middle School: This month we have continued on our exploration of creation and us humans. We looked at the creation of Adam and how he was made in God's image and thus all of us are also made in God's image. We looked at what it means to be made in God's image and how that affects our lives. We then looked at the creation of Eve. We dove deep into what it truly means for Eve to be created as Adam's "helper" and how this unfortunate translation has been used to discriminate against women through history. Lastly, we looked at how humans are made to be social and live in community. We talked a lot about friends and healthy relationships. Along with all of the Bible teaching, we did manage to have some fun. We played a lot of games, watched some Bible project videos, and did some thought experiments. Looking forward to Thanksgiving and Christmas. Always a fun time of year in class.

<u>Teen Class</u>: We are discussing the topic of fasting in all of its aspects. Learning how it can help in life and in bringing us closer to God.


This month we will be focusing on how **Sunday School Shows Us Examples And Models For A Christian Life**. *Christ, who suffered for you, is your example. Follow in His steps.* (I Peter 2:21b)

Are you familiar with the "W.W.J.D.?" What Would Jesus do? Surely there is no better example or role model for anyone to follow than Jesus Christ, but still, there is a problem. What is the problem? You can't ask "What would Jesus do?" until you know what Jesus did and said. And, quite honestly, the average person out there in the world has very little knowledge about anything that Jesus ever did or said. And, without that knowledge and understanding of what Jesus was and what He did and said, how can you possible use Him as an example to follow in your life?

But, there is a way to find out all about Jesus.. Who He is, what He did and what He said. And where can you find that information? In the Bible! And then to really understand the meaning of the Scriptures that tell us about Christ, you also need to gather together with other people of similar age and interest in Sunday School.

Using the Bible as our textbook in Sunday School, we learn about what's right and what's wrong. We see examples of people who followed God and those who rejected His leading. Micah Backpack Update

All Lincolnshire students will get free breakfast and free lunch this year. In Washington County schools, there are 925 homeless or transitional housing students. Some are in tents. Micah serves 98 students at Lincolnshire (St Andrew 24 of the 98) From this year's HARC Hike, the Micah program got \$31,000! Total hike profit was \$77,000.
